

AGM 2019 - 'It was indeed a dark and stormy night.'



The forecast for Saturday 2 November indicated that we were in for some rough weather – but nothing could have prepared us for the wind, rain and storms that heralded the 83rd FRMS AGM in Weston-super-Mare. Lovers of the sublime had plenty of 'sturm und drang' to keep them more than satisfied – and there is no doubt that, from a warm vantage point inside the Winter Gardens, there was something deeply impressive about the sight of thrashing waves and the sound of the roaring wind. Unfortunately, grappling with the elements outside was not so pleasant.

Having said that, there were no apologies because of the poor weather conditions. Members are clearly made of stern stuff!

The Winter Gardens provided us with a comfortable and modern environment for our AGM and the afternoon business meeting went ahead without a hitch. Particular mention must be made of Dianne Board, the Secretary of Weston-super-Mare Music Appreciation Society, who acted as Minutes Secretary for the meeting – not an easy task to take on at very short notice.



Business over, the pleasurable part of the day began with a presentation from Geraint Lewis and David Threasher, speakers well-known to the Weston society. Geraint is a Welsh composer and academic who has worked for Nimbus records; David is a sub-editor of Gramophone Magazine. Their excellent talk was entitled 'Take 99' and focused on the way that recordings (most apt for the FRMS) can have such a crucial impact on our appreciation and understanding of music. Both speakers talked about their early musical influences - Haydn, Mozart, Britten – and we listened to some wonderful recordings. We were also treated to William Matthias' 'Processional' played on the organ of St Paul's Cathedral by the late John Scott, as well as one of Geraint's own works, 'The Souls of the Righteous'. All

in all, an interesting, informative and varied programme. Talk about the theme - our

early musical influences - continued over a lively tea break.



A very pleasant three course dinner followed in Lasseter's restaurant, which concluded with a recital by The Abbey Quartet, a string quartet based in Glastonbury. We enjoyed a well-judged and varied programme of music arranged for strings, ranging from the 'serious': Mozart, Kreisler and

Massenet; to the 'popular': Gershwin, Leroy Anderson's 'Blue Tango' and Lennon/McCartney's 'When I'm 64' (although many felt that the title 'Wish I were 64' would have been more apt!) Feet were tapping appreciatively by the end of the evening. The highlight for me – and for many others – was an exquisite performance of Britten's Simple Symphony 3 (Sentimental Sarabande), a fitting connection back to our afternoon talk and the deep and lasting influence of Britten as a composer.

The Weston-super-Mare Music Appreciation Society has done the Federation proud this year. The inclement weather was soon forgotten in the shared enjoyment of music and companionship. We are all looking forward to Leicester next year.
